HE WAS a manager of a company with about 50 employees under him, while she was the director of human resources at a bank. Both were highly-paid but felt nowhere near where they really wanted to be. Instead, this couple who have been married for 14 years yearned for a simple and unpredictable life. So, seven years ago, the Ligatos quit their jobs, sold all their belongings — save what fitted into their campervan — and set out on a three-year, 96,560km trek across 24 countries and four continents.

Tell us about the day you decided to give it all up to embark on this adventure.

R: It all started one day when I was driving to work and chanced upon this giant bill-board of the California lottery, which was for US\$14.1 million (\$21.5 million). We don't even buy the lottery but I started thinking of what we would do if we won that.

A: At that point, both of us had been holding regular jobs for close to six years. That was our life. We didn't do anything exciting, anything different. Every day was the same. We'd always planned to do something special during the weekends but when they came, we'd be so tired from work we'd just lie in and watch TV and not do anything.

We learned how little we needed to be happy, that we only needed a few possessions to have joy in life.
